Free for law enforcement—police, deputies, corrections, probation, parole, dispatchers, etc.

CIT programs are local initiatives designed to improve the way law enforcement and the community respond to people experiencing a behavioral health crisis. They are built on strong partnerships between law enforcement, behavioral health agencies, and individuals and families affected by mental illness or addiction. Over 280 police, deputies, and corrections officers from 32 jurisdictions have completed **CIT** training in Trumbull County since 2006.
